
Now it's all about Masks and Ventilators

anyone wants to print an e-mail and send it to someone they know, feel free to do so.


Well if it wasn't enough already to make Vietnam sailors suffer from the effects of Agent Orange, along comes the Coronavirus and nails everybody.

I was born about three years before the keel of the USS Allen M. Sumner (the ship I was destined to serve on) was laid at Kearny, New Jersey so that was in the time of ration stamps.

For most Americans it was a time of doing without instead of filling a shopping card with



200 rolls of toilet paper and gallons of hand sanitizer.

I'm sure it would be hard for today's generation not to be able to have anything and everything it wanted.

Nowadays we just read in the history books about the sacrifices made during World War II such as General Motors and Ford converting assembly lines from producing cars and

trucks into tanks and airplanes.

It was all done to defeat a common enemy. The common enemy then was defeating the grasp or a dictator.

Today it's the grasp of a virus,

America experienced rationing for the first time in World War II. Some products that were rationed during World War II were sugar, meat, coffee, typewriters, fuel oil, gasoline, rubber, and automobiles.

Food rationing probably affected most Americans the most. Each American was issued a book of ration coupons each month.

Every American was issued a series of ration books during the war. The ration books contained removable stamps good for certain rationed items, like sugar, meat, cooking oil, and canned goods. A person could not buy a rationed item without also giving the grocer the right ration stamp.

Civilian hospitals received only small amounts of penicillin during the war, because it was not mass-produced for civilian use until after the war.

VFW National Commander B.J. Lawrence said "If we can afford to send veterans to war, it's unacceptable that we can't afford to take care of them when they return home wounded, ill or injured," he said.

"Agent Orange made Vietnam veterans sick, and even the former Institute of Medicine agrees when it concluded that there isn't any scientific basis to treat Blue Water Navy veterans any different in regards to Agent Orange exposure than their peers who served on the land or inland waters of Vietnam," he said.

A triage panel at each hospital decided which patients would receive the penicillin.

Now we are trying to produce face masks and ventilators.

Thank goodness there was no pandemic to contend with. Fighting the enemy on two con-

tinents was bad enough.

A national speed limit of 35 miles per hour was imposed to save fuel and rubber for tires.

To get a classification and rationing stamps, one had to appear before a local War

Price and Rationing Board which reported to the Office of Price Administration (OPA).

Each person in a household received a ration book, including babies and small children who qualified for canned milk not available to others. To receive a gasoline ration card, a person had to certify a need for gasoline and ownership of no more than five tires.

Sugar was the first consumer commodity rationed followed by coffee - about a half-pound per week.

Even pets were not exempt.

As of March 1, 1942, dog food could no longer be sold in tin cans, and manufacturers switched to dehydrated versions.

And, as of April 1, 1942, anyone wishing to

purchase a new toothpaste tube - then made from metal - had to turn in an empty one.

To receive a gasoline ration card, a person had to certify a need for gasoline and ownership of no more than five tires.

All tires in excess of five per driver were confiscated by the government, because of rubber shortages.

An "A" sticker on a car was the lowest priority of gasoline rationing and entitled the car owner to 3 to 4 US gallons of gasoline per week. B stickers were issued to workers in the military industry, entitling their

holder to up to 8 US gallons of gasoline per week.

C stickers were granted to persons deemed very essential to the war effort, such as doctors. T stickers were made available for truckers.

Lastly, X stickers on cars entitled the holder to unlimited supplies and were the highest priority in the system.

Clergy, police, firemen, and civil defense workers were in this category.

A scandal erupted when 200 Congressmen received these X stickers.
